Joint WikiVet project on Online Publishing

WikiVet is a partner in a new project funded by JISC entitled "Investigating new business models for including published works in OER (PublishOER)". The project is led by Newcastle University and includes the RVC and Nottingham veterinary schools. It provides exciting new opportunities for WikiVet as it will involve working with leading science publishers, including Elsevier, to explore new models for publishing veterinary content. Online Veterinary Anatomy Museum



We have just heard that another major new WikiVet based project has received over £130,000 of JISC funding. The <u>Online Veterinary Anatomy Museum</u> (OVAM) involves all the UK and Irish veterinary schools as well as partners overseas and commercial publishers.

The aim is to develop a comprehensive and educationally focused online anatomy museum by pooling resources from all the project partners. This is one of the first times that so many vetschools have signed up to a joint bid and represents the potential of WikiVet to foster collaboration.

We will be hosting an opening ceremony for the OVAM project at the Royal Veterinary College's Hawkshead Campus in Hertfordshire, UK on the 9th December. Partners of the project will be meeting, but other interested parties are welcome to attend. Please <a href="mailto:e

Users on WikiVet

WikiVet registrations are still increasing rapidly, we now have over 13,250 registered users. We thought we'd tell you a bit more this month about where some of these latest registrations are coming from...



In October of this year WikiVet had a total of 768 new users registered. 574 of these were vet students, of which about 50% were in their first year of study. We had 140 graduated vets join us also, as well as nurses, student nurses and academics.

353 of our users came from the UK, with the next highest intake from Canada at 48, then Australia at 39. We had more from Poland than ever before with 23, and it seems our first Student Ambassadors are doing a good job as we've seen increases from their schools also.
